### Positions available with Squadron.

For 57 years the Halifax Power and Sail Squadron has provided boating courses to its members and the general public in the Halifax area. In order to continue this service, we require an Executive Committee who administers the operation of the squadron. Without members who are prepared to volunteer for these positions, the Halifax Squadron may not be able to continue to offer these courses. In the coming year we have members who have served for many years who have advised that they are not able to continue. We also have a few positions that have been vacant for several years, again with others doing two and three positions. The Squadron Executive Committee meets the 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday of each month from 19:00-21:00, except for December, July, and August.

Please consider volunteering for one of the following positions which **must** be filled for the Squadron to continue.

### 1. Secretary:

This position requires that the monthly agenda is forwarded to the Executive Committee prior the monthly meeting working with the Commander to produce the agenda.

• Attending the monthly meeting to take the minutes.





- Producing the minutes and emailing to the Executive Committee.
- Producing the AGM Notice of Meeting and making sure all reports are done by the Executive Committee members for the AGM.
- Assisting the Commander as necessary.

### 2. Supply Officer:

You would work directly with the Squadron Educational Officer to determine which courses and number of course kits need to be ordered from the National Office.

- Responsible to have the course material available in time for each course.
- Attend first class of each course to hand out the material and if a student registers late or has not paid for the course, collect the fee before handing out material.
- Responsible to get the course fees to the Treasurer.
- Keep a full inventory list of what has been ordered, handed out and in stock.
- Needs to have a place to store material (small storage cabinet available).
- Attends the Executive Committee meetings and AGM.

### 3. Public Relations Officer:

This position is the liaison between the Squadron Education Officer and the Squadron members and the public. The person in this position advertises courses and makes sure that our educational offerings are well known.

- Works directly with the Squadron Educational Officer to advertise the courses being offered each year.
- Needs to get together the information and disseminate to various locations and yacht clubs for public to be aware of the courses being offered.
- Make sure our pamphlets are in the various locations for the public.
- Assist with the yearly Halifax International Boat Show booth.

### The Annual Meeting and AGM of CPS-ECP, 17 to 19 October 2019 in Victoria, BC

Victoria was a nice location to hold the Annual General Meeting of CPS-ECP. The city is right on the water with the legislative assembly building facing the inlet. Looking out of the windows from the Empress Hotel, the meeting headquarters, we could see water taxis, whale watchers, a fishing boat, and multitudes of pleasure craft. The scene reminded me of a previous trip to Victoria to see friends. During that March trip, my friends and I went sailing in cloudy, cool, and drizzly conditions. If easterners wanted to know more about westerners and their environment,





all they had to do is look out the window. The weather was cool with alternating sunshine, clouds, and thick drizzle. It appeared to be classic west coast winter weather.

Inside the hotel, the atmosphere was warm and up-beat, as the events of the AGM progressed with the guidance of Janet Fraser and her AGM organizing committee. Janet is also the Chair of the Boating 5 (AKA Advanced Piloting) course committee. Four members of the Squadron attended: Catherine Lunn, Sarah-Jane Raine, Norman Raine, and Howard Donohoe.

Most of the time of the AGM is directed toward a host of meetings. Some of these are for groups such as Squadron Commanders, District Commanders, national education committee, Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. Many sessions are open for all. These include the reports and comments from the national education committee and the environment committee on Thursday evening. On Friday afternoon, the IT committee made its report and we heard a fascinating talk about marine mammals and whales by a member of the Environment Committee. On Saturday afternoon members of the national education committee were joined by other interested members to discuss some of the initiatives to be taken by CPS-ECP in education.

The organizing committee had several interesting trips. One was whale watching, in which our Commander, Catherine Lunn reported seeing some whales and a lot of beautiful scenery. A contingent of members visited the Canadian Coast Guard's marine communications and traffic services centre. This is equivalent to "Halifax Traffic," which is the CCG's MCTS centre in Halifax. A ghost walk at night and a trip to the world famous Butchart Gardens rounded out the out-trips. Butchart Gardens is a marvellous example of what can be done to remediate a former surface mine that was a large hole in the ground. The former mine supplied limestone for lower Vancouver Island and other areas in the region.

with a return to last year's talk about the Caribbean. This year he spoke about getting there: outside the islands or island-hopping. As usual, Dan had a wealth of information from many years of cruising in the Caribbean and elsewhere. His talks



combine his experience with delightful anecdotes about life onboard and life on the islands of the Caribbean.

Two years ago, Judy Robertson took us by way of slides and words to Cape Horn and then south to Antarctica. She showed us the Horn on a sunny, calm day with a F2 or F3 wind. This year, her January talk took us to the warmth of the Mediterranean Sea. She began her journey with us on the Atlantic



coast of Spain at Rota. This seaport's claim to fame from the 1970s was an accident. The US Air Force accidentally dropped an un-armed atomic weapon into the ocean and spent many months trying to find it. Judy and her crew had no such problems and sailed from Rota to Morocco. The food, architecture, and culture of Morocco were illustrated by some beautiful pictures. Then it was off through the Pillars of Hercules (Strait of Gibraltar) into the Med. She noted



the currents can be treacherous in the straight. Judy regaled us with tales of life on the water, on the hard, and back in the water. Pesky wiring problems dogged her journey, but that became a lesson in determined problem solving. Once again Judy's story telling enthralled the audience.

#### **National Education Committee Activities**

This important committee under the direction of Jean-Robert Lavergne advises the Board of Directors about the philosophy of approach and direction of CPS-ECP's principle purpose: safety on the water through education. The Education Committee hosted an open meeting at the annual meeting on Thursday evening to a packed room. The speaker, education committee member Eileen Germain from Trois Rivière Squadron, told the audience about strategies and methods of pedagogy that the committee would like to encourage. The committee is encouraging course instructors to lecture less, use more active learning, encourage students to use their prior knowledge, and have students help each other with cooperative learning. Use of on-line learning and blended learning (both in-person and on-line learning) are becoming more important now. She spoke about a new initiative to talk to every Squadron about a new "Instructor's Tool Kit."

On 17 November 2019, Eileen and Yves Dauphinais hosted a full day meeting at Dartmouth Yacht Club for squadron executive members, instructors and proctors from Alderney, Bluenose and Halifax squadrons. We learned about the toolbox and then we practiced several strategies that move students away from passive learners who are just listening to active learners who are participating.
